NOTE FROM LAWSON - SIXTH SUNDAY IN THE EASTER SEASON!

One more week and the Easter season will culminate in Pentecost! I can't imagine what it would be like to live through the Easter events. Some people say it would be easier to have a transformative relationship with Christ if you could just be with him, *see* him and talk to him like the apostles did. There's part of me that thinks that might be, but mostly I prefer the two thousand years we have of thoughtful insight and clarity of looking backward. Sometimes when you are in the middle of it, you can't really grasp what's happening.

Imagine seeing Jesus' torture and execution, burial, resurrection and interaction. I'm pretty sure that's one of those can't believe your eyes things. Then comes the day when you stand around with your other excited but confused friends, and ask Jesus, hey, is this the time where you restore the kingdom to Israel? Acts 1:6, rough translation! And his answer is, no. YOU will. And then he lifts off into the sky and a cloud took him from their sight.

That would be pretty confusing, you've got to admit. We have the benefit of history – we know what happens next, but they didn't! Was he coming back soon? What were they to do? What did he mean, YOU do it? Definitely, the best thing to do, for heaven's sakes, is go back to town and organize a committee to find a replacement for Judas. When you have no idea what's going on, get a committee. I love, love how human the apostles are. I appreciate their foibles and struggles, mistakes and bone-headed decisions all of which they tell us themselves. I love Scripture! Nothing dull about it.

I love reading and wondering, imagining the scene, who I would be in it, what would I think or do, listening to what God is saying to me, being open to a dialogue with God through his word. This is a form of prayer called *Lectio Divina*, used since the sixth century as a way to communicate with God through Scripture. It's listening with the ear of your heart.

I also love stained glass windows in old churches, and can get lost in reflecting on them. Recently, I learned that's another form of prayer, called *Visio Divina* – praying with the *eyes* of your heart. We have so many senses and so many ways to connect with God through them. You might love music, or art, or nature, or even silence. Our prayer lives are enriched by interacting with God in all these ways. All you really need is an open heart, listening posture and time set aside to do it.
